CHAPTER NINE

MEMBERSHIP AND VOLUNTEERS' ACTIVITIES

From the very beginning ORTA flourished as many volunteer hours were invested in publicising the moraine, our proposed trail and recruitment of Members to further these goals. Volunteer Coordinator Peter Attfield's yellow insert in Summer 2000 Trail Talk – see Appendix 9.1 - identified the many volunteers needed for ORTA to further all its perceived opportunities.

Membership Categories and Dues

As recounted in Chapter Two 35 individuals signed up at the Founding Meeting in May 1992 and another 14 (some were couples) joined by October. The annual Membership Fee was set at \$15.00 with a reduced rate of \$10.00 for students. ¹

Questions soon arose, not only internally but also from the insurers: Is a Membership for an individual? What about spouses and children? So, the category of Family Membership was introduced at \$20.00 p.a. There could be only one vote per Membership however many might constitute the family. Similarly only one copy of Trail Talk and other mailings would be sent to each household. Eventually the HO's General Liability Insurers agreed to base their premium on the number of Memberships and not on an estimated total number of people.

In 1999 the option of becoming a Life Membership for a one-time subscription of \$300 was introduced. Apparently initially Life Members were presented with a Certificate at the ensuing AGM – we don't have a sample on file

Effective June 1, 2001 dues were increased: Family \$25.00, Individual \$20.00, and Student \$15.00. In proposing this increase at the AGM the Board explained

Some people were only interested in participating locally and there was discussion in 1993 of Chapter Memberships at a reduced rate. With the proposed Chapters corresponding to single municipalities looking after 15 to 40 km of trail it was decided ORTA would not follow the BTA model as a "Federation of Clubs" each with its own President, Board and finances administering between 40 and 170 km of trail.

that as we succeeded in getting more of the trail onto private land our costs would increase. The additional \$5.00 p.a. per Member would be held in a Land Acquisition Fund.

At the AGM in 2005 the categories of membership as defined in the Constitution were rationalised. At the same time it was realised that membership dues were not covering base operating costs and thus dues were increased so that donations could be directed towards developments. Hence the new schedule:


Member \$ 30.00 p.a. (Family or Individual)

Student Member \$ 20.00 p.a.

Life Member \$450.00 (Per couple)

Honorary Member

In 2016 the Annual Membership was increased to \$40.00.



Honorary Members

"A person may become an Honorary Member on appointment by the Directors and shall be exempt from payment of dues."

In 2007 the Board decided that all Landowners should be designated as Honorary Members. See Appendix 5.1.

Each was sent a plaque and asked to nominate a representative to attend Members' meetings; few have exercised this option.

Membership Growth

Sylvia Gilchrist remembers that initially it was one of her duties as Secretary to maintain a list of Members.

In 1995 Bill Roberts joined the board as Membership Coordinator and set himself the target of doubling Membership by the next AGM. A target which he surpassed with a total of 281 – "give or take 20 or so who have yet to renew."

In 1997 the Constitution was revised to make the Membership Co-ordinator and the Publicity Director members of the Executive Committee alongside the Officers (President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Past-President) reflecting the importance of these roles

At the AGM in May 1999 Bill announced "the current membership is 786, 47% of which are Family Memberships." Bill made a tremendous contribution to ORTA; he participated in promotional activities, processed memberships and renewals and maintained the database. Under Bill's stewardship net membership increased by 155 a year. As President Bob Ellison wrote in Spring 2000 Trail Talk: "We hadn't realized what a big job it was until Bill decided to move on to other interests."

At the AGM in 2000 Sharon Emmerson reported the paid Membership currently stood at 903 which, computing from the number of Family Memberships meant ORTA was 1,436 persons strong.

Membership Teams

A team of three was found necessary to continue the work Bill had been doing; Sharon Emmerson as Membership Co-ordinator was assisted by Diane Hughes to collect and process the mail and deal with enquiries and Laura Novikow to maintain the database, issue renewal notices and make labels for Trail Talk.

In 2002 Marilyn Mussel became Membership Coordinator and Charlotte Owen joined the team to handle mailing of packages to new members: A letter of Welcome, an ORTA Crest, a copy of Trail Talk and, if ordered, a Guidebook. *Marilyn and Charlotte*

After Laura Novikow moved away in 2003 Bob Hughes joined the team as technical consultant. He developed the computerised database which allowed items such as membership renewal notices, donation receipts and the Trail Talk mailing list to be generated



automatically. Increasingly communications with members was by e-mail; Elinor Allison took on the task of tracking incorrect email addresses.



Bob became Membership Coordinator in 2004 and diligently fulfilled this time consuming role for a decade, ably supported by Diane. Charlotte Owen took on the task of mailing membership renewal notices.

Membership Dues became eligible for Income Tax Receipts in 2006; whenever possible these were sent by email from the office. Office Manager, Judith Reda also took on the mailing out of New Member packages and Guidebooks in 2007. Dianne Zieman took over tracking email addresses.

In 2011 Judy Comfort undertook phoning inactive members and new Office Manager Michele Donnelly added phoning new members to her duties.

Membership Turnover and Decline

Discussions at board meetings and retreats consistently identified good reasons why our membership ought to grow to at least 1,500. But 903 in fact proved to be our peak membership.

Over the years there has been a consistent and continuing pattern of membership turnover. For example in 2003 it was noted we were gaining 14 new members a month but averaging a loss of 20. A good number of people became Members and were quite active for two or three years or so, getting to know the trail in their locality and participating in activities such as trail maintenance, but then moved on to other interests. ²



Particularly during 2002 – 2003 there was a strong effort to arrest this trend by a Membership Committee comprising Diane Hughes as Chair, Volunteer Co-ordinator Virginia Johnson and Publicity Director Wilma Backus working with Marilyn Mussel. Volunteers phoned lapsed members; Chapter Chairs received monthly lists of new members so they could be welcomed and their questions addressed; and, Hike Leaders were reminded to talk to non-members on the benefits of joining ORTA. Advice repeated frequently over the years. Each chapter was asked to have a local publicity representative.

² SGB: Others maybe joined as a way to show their support for protection of the moraine but when The Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Act addressed their concerns they didn't continue with ORTA. They would learn that our association's role is complementary to STORM's and ORMLT's roles – see Chapter Two, pages 206 and 209.

Also membership fluctuates across the seasons, so it's not always easy to immediately detect trends. This can be seen from this graph presented by Bob Hughes in 2008.



Some Members delay renewal until after a third notice, for example the 2012 Membership Database shows there were also 40 Members listed as lapsed – Annual Dues up to three months overdue – not counted, but not yet struck off.

In preparation for the 20^{th} Anniversary Celebrations in April 2012 an additional 500 copies of the special edition of $Trail\ Talk$ and the Financial Appeal were printed with the objective of mailing to former Members. However, this supply was used up mailing to those who had failed to renew during the previous five years . . . indicating an average turnover of 100 Members per annum.

Administrative Tasks

ORTA is indebted to Bob Ellison who developed a working constitution. Association Officers – President, Secretary and Treasurer, supported by the Past and Vice Presidents – put in a good many hours each year to keep the wheels turning.

Roles such as Trail Talk Editor and Hike Coordinator make demands which must be accomplished at specific dates. Volunteer teams have been regularly called on to undertake tasks such as assembly of Guidebooks, stuffing envelopes for general mail-outs and many more. Sadly we have not been very consistent in engaging volunteers to phone new members and lapsed members.

Volunteers and Chapter Organization - team-orta

ORTA has from the start been a volunteer led association. In Chapters Two, Three and Four the leadership provided by the Directors is evident. But there's even more work to be done at local chapter level. Larger chapters such as Aurora have a formal committee structure; most operate by personal phone calls.

Opposite: a typical team-orta directory - you'll need to zoom in to read it.

Note the Board position of Volunteer Coordinator was vacant; sadly this has often been the case. Effective recruiting and deployment of volunteers is most often the result of one-on-one contacts by Chapter Chairs and conversations during hikes.

A New Database and Membership Team for a New Era

In 2014 Kevin Lowe became Membership Co-ordinator and maintaining the Membership Database was assumed by Office Manager Michele Donnelly. It was time for the system to be updated; Kevin was assisted by Michele and Frank Alexander in selecting and putting to work the *Wild Apricot* management system.

Kevin became President in 2016 and noted: "the lower active membership of 593 . . . is not a cause for great concern as our core membership remains solid."

Sandra Dipietrantonio became the new Membership Co-ordinator.



Trail Maintenance

The exciting work of developing the trail is described in Chapter Five and employed many enthusiastic volunteer hours. Subsequently the trail has to be maintained year over year. Trails Director Ray Matsalla presented guidelines at the AGM in 1996; these require written reports on Trail Inspections Spring and Fall.

Trail Captains are the key to maintenance by taking regular walks through their designated length of trail. Is signage still in place? Is there a need to call for help to deal with treefalls, trimming of foliage, undue littering or vandalism? Most chapters have two or more trail maintenance days when a number of volunteers go out in teams. Particularly important is the maintenance of styles, bridges and boardwalks.

ORTA does not own the trail property and in some locations other than minor maintenance is done by the landowner – e.g. Conservation Authority, Regional Forestry and Municipal Parks. Trail on private land requires more volunteer effort. King Chapter had a number of volunteers certified to use chain saws. Using powered equipment requires adherence to safety codes of practice.

For roadside clean-ups volunteers are encouraged to wear safety vests.

In addition to ORTA Members a number of corporate teams have provided valuable assistance in tasks such as rebuilding boardwalks and major clean-ups.

Public Event Displays

In the chapter on publicity we note the many occasions when volunteers have staffed displays in malls, libraries and at local festivals.

Adventure Relay

This annual fundraiser is of importance to the association as it brings together in one event as many as 100 volunteers - not just on the day but in the training and other lead-up activities which make it so successful.

Hike Leaders

By no means last or least - the hiking program is truly a labour of love by the Hike Leaders. For many leading hikes is their favourite activity even though they have other roles in ORTA.

ORTA Volunteer Awards Scheme

Introduced in 2002 the Volunteer Awards presented at the annual meeting recognize those Members who make outstanding contributions to the association. The selection is made by an Awards Sub-committee (usually the Past President, another Director and a Member not on the Board) based on nominations from Members. The Lifetime Achievement Award was introduced in 2004.

The lists of recipients 2002 to 2017 are in Appendix 9.2. Sadly it will be noticed that some members who made outstanding contributions during the first decade of the association's history had moved on before the scheme was instituted.

The Oak Ridges Trail Association is rightly proud of the accomplishments of its volunteer Members throughout its history.

CHAPTER NINE - APPENDIX 9.2
